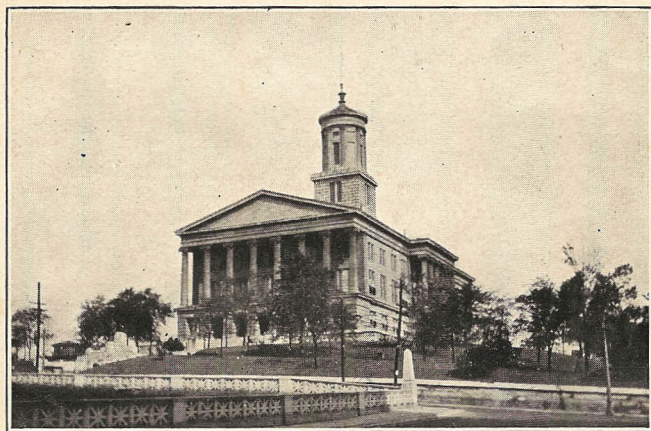

ON OUR VACATION

On Monday, August 2, my boy friend and I left our homes in Bryan for a trip through the middle southern states by auto. We arrived in Cincinnati in the evening. After looking up a friend we had supper and then drove all about the city seeing what we could see in the dark. We drove up hill for nearly four miles right in the city.

The second day was scheduled for a long drive. We crossed the Ohio river into Covington, Kentucky. After leaving Covington we drove for miles and miles in hills and woods. The roads were hard surfaced but rough. For ten or twelve miles going into Lexington we passed large Kentucky estates. The houses were very large with colonades in front. Thirty or forty rods back from the houses were U shaped stables. Of course we were in the fine horse country. At one place we saw a dozen or more jockies exercising some real fine horses.

At Richmond, Kentucky, we had dinner. One place they were loading stock along the railroad. All of the men, young and old, carried canes. It must be their custom. Later we drove up hill for several miles to the top of Cumberland mountain. There we left Kentucky going into Virginia and then into Tennessee in less than five minutes. Then we descended the mountain to Cumberland Gap, Tennessee. After a few miles of rough roads we had fine roads the rest of the way to Knoxville, Tenn.

The state of Tennessee has real good roads and the curves and turns are well marked. Going into Knoxville we followed along a small stream in a narrow valley for many miles, crossing back and forth over it on narrow wooden bridges every half mile or so. Arriving in Knoxville late we put up for the night. On Wednesday we drove about seeing some of that city, including the University of Tennessee, and then started for Chattanooga. Along the way we sighted a new crop to us, finding out later that it was cotton. We had dinner in Cleveland, Tennessee, and in the afternoon drove into the mountains. While upon them a storm came up and we were very

close to it. We entered Chattanooga through a tunnel under Missionary Ridge. We drove out to Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia, and saw the barracks, the training or drilling grounds and the officers' homes. There the Chickamauga battlefield begins, extending for five miles. In it are tablets stating the positions of the different parts of the armies and description of the battle. Some of the old houses that were taken from the people by the armies and used as headquarters are still standing. Thousands of monuments are scattered all about the park representing different divisions of both sides. From there we drove along Missionary Ridge getting a birdseye view of Chattanooga. At Chattanooga we met a former Bryan man. He showed us the city at night from Cameron Hill; The General, the historic engine of the war; and other things of interest. On Thursday morning he took us to Lookout mountain where we could see seven states, the battlefield, and the bends of the Tennessee river. The Moccasin bend is named so because the river is in the shape of a moccasin. From there we went to the National Cemetery and to Signal mountain several miles away. The armies signaled from this mountain to Lookout mountain with smoke and thus it bears this name. There we saw the Grand Canyon of the Tennessee river. All of this scenery is too beautiful for words to describe.

From Signal mountain we drove to Jasper, Tennessee. It is nearly the same as many other county seats in the South, a small town of about seven hundred inhabitants, with no pavements and very few stores. We stopped at the hotel there, a large home. Every one sat down to one large table and the eats were passed to each other. It was a typical southern dinner including baked stuffed mangoes, muffins, biscuits and such.

From there we drove into Alabama, then over Eagle mountain to Nashville, Tennessee. It was primary election day. The different men running for nomination for governor had their headquarters at the old historic Maxwell House, an old hotel connected with different his-

toric events. The next morning we
saw the capitol building. On the
grounds is a monument to Andrew
Jackson and the grave of James K.
Polk.

At Bowling Green, Kentucky, we
had dinner and then left for Mam-
moth Cave. There are four trips
scheduled in Mammoth Cave. We
took No. 1, which covers five miles,
and includes some of the larger cav-
erns, several pits and domes, Mam-
moth dome and the river ride. Some
of the pits are more than one hun-
dred feet deep. Where there is a pit
there is a dome just above. In one
of the chambers the guide made the
most wonderful tones with his voice
that I ever heard. We went riding
on Echo river, which is 360 feet be-
low the surface of the earth. The
boat will hold about twenty-five peo-
ple and the ride is nearly a mile
long. While on the river the guide
made more tones. They were better
than the best pipe organ in the
world. The water in the river is
from ten to thirty feet deep. The
guide told us that there are 180
miles traversable in this cave.

On Saturday morning we went to
Great Onyx Cave, which contains
crystal and onyx formations. One of
these is ten feet high and seven feet
through. They are formed by water
dripping from the ceiling. If it drops
faster than once every two hours it
will not form. Thus it must have
taken many thousand years for the
large ones to form. The water drop-
ping from the ceiling forms a stalac-
tite then as it drops to the floor it
forms a stalagmite. Eventually the
two meet and form a column from
ceiling to floor. Light shining on
the crystals makes them look like
diamonds. This trip extended for
more than a mile into the cave.

After leaving the caves that even-
ing we crossed the Ohio river at
Louisville, Kentucky, and drove to
Indianapolis, Indiana, yet that night.
The next morning we saw several of
the public buildings and other things
of interest in Indianapolis and left
for Bryan, arriving home in the af-
ternoon. Such a trip teaches one
more than three months reading and
is worth many times what it cost.

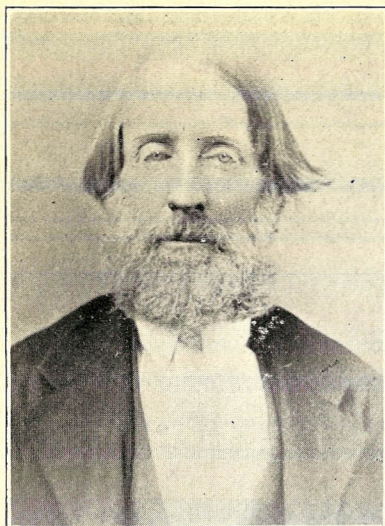

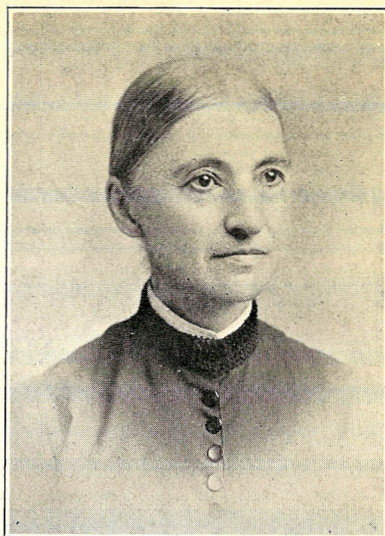


LEVI DAVIS

HISTORY OF LEVI DAVIS AND FAMILY

Levi Davis, twin of Israel and son of Daniel Davis, Sr., and Sarah Albright Davis, was born near Salem, Columbiana county, Ohio, June 4, 1825. When he was about three years of age his mother died. Afterward he was adopted by Thomas and Catherine Calahan, of Salem, Ohio. Levi was a coal miner by trade.

He married Anna Mary Stakemyre of near Greenford, Mahoning county, Ohio. The children, George, John,

Israel, Frank, William, Catherine and her twin who died unnamed, were born in Ohio. In the year 1861 the family moved to Pennsylvania. Jacob Wesley and Sarah Anna were born in that state. In 1864 they moved to West Virginia, across the river from Steubenville, Ohio. At that place Rosina Jane was born.

The family afterward lived in Washington, Beaver and Fayette counties in Pennsylvania. Levi died near New Salem, January 27, 1884.

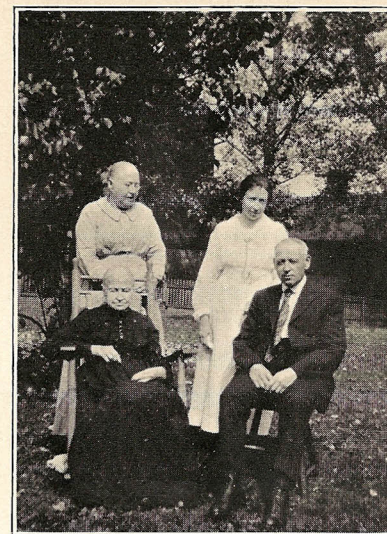

In November, 1882, they moved to Lebanon county and in 1909 moved to the home of their daughter, Mrs. Lizzie Hitz, at Quentin, where Mr. Teahl died in 1911.

The rest of her life was spent at the homes of her children. After an illness of six weeks she died at the home of Mrs. Hitz on February 28, 1924. She is buried in St. Pauls Reformed Church cemetery at Quentin, Pa.
